## UNEMPLOYMENT DIGEST



The Information contained in this report is based on Claimant Count figures. The Claimant Count measures the number of people claiming benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed. The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) introduced a new benefit, Universal Credit, in April 2013. At present Universal Credit benefit is not included in the Claimant Count figures. Office for National Statistics (ONS) and DWP are working to include jobseeker Universal Credit claims in the Claimant Count as soon as possible.

The rates for April 2014 and May 2013 vary slightly from those included in previous unemployment digests. This is due to the introduction of revised workplace-based denominators which have been updated using new 2013 estimates.

The May 2014 claimant count unemployment figures\* were released on 11th June 2014.

As illustrated by the chart below, the Highlands and Islands continues to have significantly lower unemployment than either Scotland or the UK - a trend which has been fairly constant since the recession.




In May 2014, the average claimant count unemployment rate for the Travel to Work Areas (TTWAs) that comprise the Highlands and Islands was **1.7%**, which was below the rates for both Scotland **(2.9%)** and the UK **(2.7%).** The region's rate fell by 0.2% on the previous month and was lower than a year earlier (2.4% in May 2013).

The TTWAs whose rates exceeded the Scottish average in May 2014 were Wick (3.6%), Dunoon & Bute (3.5%), Invergordon (3.2%) and Campbeltown (3.1%). Nine TTWAs in the Highlands and Islands had rates in May 2014 lower than 1.7% – Skye & Lochalsh (1.6%), Oban (1.5%), Inverness & Dingwall and Lochaber (both 1.3%), Ullapool & Gairloch (1.0%), Badenoch and Mull & Islay (both 0.9%) and Orkney and Shetland (both 0.8%).

The total number of people claiming unemployment benefit in the HIE area<sup>^</sup> in May 2014 was 5,013. Out of the total, some 2,205 were long term unemployed<sup>\*\*</sup> and 1,015 were claimants aged 18-24.
