Unemployment Digest

The August 2013 claimant count unemployment figures were released on 11th September 2013.

As illustrated by the chart below, the Highlands and Islands continues to have significantly lower unemployment than either Scotland or the UK – a trend which has been fairly constant since the recession.




In August 2013, the average claimant count unemployment rate for the Travel to Work Areas (TTWAs) that comprise the Highlands and Islands was 2.2%, which was below the rates for both Scotland (3.8%) and the UK's (3.4%). The region's rate decreased from the previous month by 0.1% and was 18% lower than a year earlier (2.7% in August 2012).

The TTWAs whose rates exceeded the Scottish average in August 2013 were Wick (4.4%), and Dunoon & Bute (4.3%). Seven TTWAs in the Highlands and Islands had rates in August 2013 lower than 2% – Skye & Lochalsh (1.9%), Dornoch & Lairg (1.9%), Lochaber (1.6%), Mull & Islay (1.3%), Badenoch (1.3%), Ullapool & Gairloch (1.2%), Orkney Islands (1.1%) and Shetland Islands (1.0%).

The total number of people claiming unemployment benefit in the HIE area[†] in August 2013 was 6,037. Out of the total, some 2,780 were long-term unemployed[‡] (46%) and 1,445 were claimants aged 18-24.
